
Your Tenancy Agreement

It includes what you pay, looking after your home and other rules.




This guide goes with your tenancy agreement and helps to explain it.



Your tenancy agreement gives you the right to live in your own house or flat as long as you do these things.








Rent

Keep to any other rules that go with the house. This could be about health, fire or safety.




